WHAT'S ON?

Learning Bibliolog in an Intercultural Context in English language **8 to 12 June 2026** at **Christian Jensen Kolleg Breklum Germany**

The Bibliolog takes people quickly and at the same time deeply into a biblical text from the perspective of biblical figures. In a biblical story, the thoughts 'between the lines' come to the fore – that is, what the characters might have thought, hoped or felt at the time – or what we think and feel today when we put ourselves in the characters' shoes.

The intercultural Bibliolog training offers interested people from different countries and cultural backgrounds the opportunity to learn the basic steps of Bibliolog in English. Through intercultural exchange, participants learn how to practise Bibliolog in their contexts so that people can discover biblical texts interactively and in a personally meaningful way in their context. This approach is examined from a hermeneutical perspective, taking into account the understanding of the text, one's own understanding of one's role, and the significance of the subject in the interpretation of the Bible. Seeing the Invisible

Hope as a driving force between uncertainty and drive

To shape our future in the face of global crises, we need perspectives that are stronger than helplessness and uncertainty. What if our thinking were not dominated by fear and pessimism, but by trust, courage and a hope that enables us to overcome crises? Hope represents the ability to make effective decisions amidst global and individual uncertainties. Medicine and psychology show that positive expectations for the future influence therapeutic success, modulate stress regulation and promote resilience. What mechanisms are at work – and how can therapeutic and counselling practice make use of this knowledge?

The 54th Northern European Conference offers reflection and inspiration for participants’ own professional work through lectures from theological, psychological and sociological perspectives, as well as through practical workshops.

The conference is aimed at psychotherapists, pastoral carers, pastoral psychologists, supervisors and counsellors. The conference languages are English and German.

Walking a different way: A weekend of reflection on our lives, challenges and hopes through the lens of Rene Girard. 12th–14th June Ballycastle Centre, Corrymeela Community, N Ireland.

Over the years the work of Rene Girard on violence, our mimetic rivalry and our tendency to scapegoat others for our difficulties has shaped the life of many in Corrymeela. His work also allowed us to rethink our faith and take time to rediscover what it means to ‘follow Jesus’.

The weekend is made up of group sessions exploring these issues as they affect our own lives and hopes. It is a chance both to revisit some of that learning and/or to discover it for the first time, by thinking about the real challenges in our lives and by asking questions together and exploring some of Girard’s thinking about how we might find ways to freedom. 📍 Where are you based?

Our offices are in Karlsruhe, Germany. At the same time, we understand ourselves as a mobile academy: much of our work takes place in different locations, in partnerships, public settings and local contexts. Compared with some other German academies, we are a relatively small team.

👥 What do you do? Who are your people?

We work across theology, ethics and public life. Our fields include religious worldviews, digital ethics, the world of work, agriculture, spirituality, music, peace and theology. We also run a youth academy with a particular focus on queer issues, pastoral care and support.

Alongside lectures, conferences and public debate formats, we are involved in mediation and consultation for NGOs, companies, political actors and civil society initiatives. Because Karlsruhe is an important legal and political location, legal and constitutional questions are also part of our context... and we run many really big events.



🔍 Do you have a particular focus for this year?

This year, we are focusing especially on two major themes: democracy and how it can be protected, and AI as a profound global transformation. In the field of democracy, this includes work on right-wing Christianity, public discussion formats and cultural, theater & music events. In the field of AI, we are particularly interested in its ethical, political, theological and social implications.

⚡ Do you have a spotlight event in 2026?

One major focus in 2026 is a conference on war and peace in the age of digital escalation. It will address drones and autonomous weapons, algorithmic disinformation, and the influence of bot networks on political culture and democratic processes.

⚠️ What are your main concerns/challenges right now?

Like many church-related institutions, we are facing financial pressure and the need to work with fewer resources. At the same time, we are moving into closer cooperation with the field of adult education. We see this not only as a structural challenge, but also as an opportunity: it can strengthen our public profile, create synergies and open new forms of collaboration.

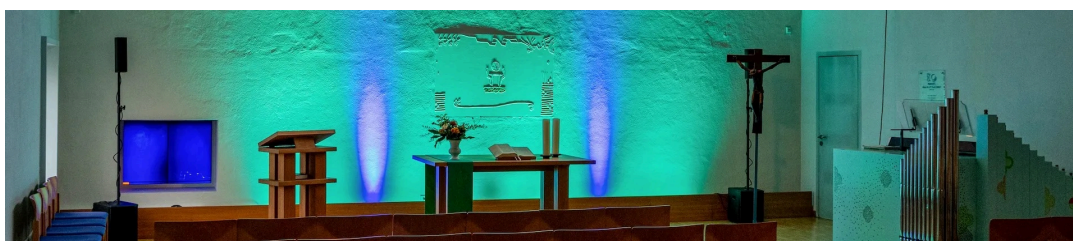
📸 **Do you have a publication /image /article /video /graphic to share?**

📌 **Tell us about one project or line of work that is important at this time.**

One of our most important lines of work at the moment is the societal, ethical and theological interpretation of AI. In our view, the significance of AI is still widely misunderstood: sometimes exaggerated in spectacular ways, but often underestimated in its real structural consequences.

For us, large language models are not the endpoint, but an early sign of a much broader transformation. AI is already reshaping communication, knowledge, education, labour, political discourse, care, theology and public culture. This is why we see it not as a niche topic, but as one of the central civilisational questions of our time.



★ **What do you value about being part of Oikosnet?**

We value Oikosnet as a space of international relationships, exchange of ideas and spiritual inspiration.

After 13 years in the network, it is exciting to see its development from an annual gathering into a more visible and genuinely European platform for discourse, education and theology. For us, this is especially important at a time when theological reflection and public debate need stronger transnational spaces of exchange and discernment.

🌐 **What would you like Oikosnet to do at the next GA?**

We would like the next GA to engage more deliberately with a small number of urgent common themes:

- new forms of imperial power in the 21st century
- Ukraine and the reconfiguration of the global order
- digital literacy as a basic precondition for theological judgement, political agency and responsible public action

Beyond this, we would like Oikosnet to become a stronger European space for discourse, education and theological discernment — one that not only convenes people, but also fosters sustained reflection, intellectual exchange and common initiatives in public theology.

Alf Linderman, former director of [Sigtuna](#), writes ...

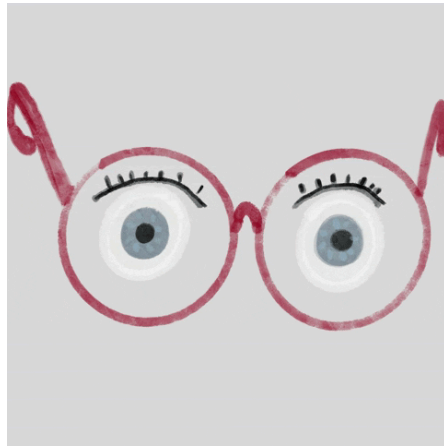
“One magazine in Sweden, Språktidningen, every year asks a representative sample of the Swedish population about what they think is the best Swedish word.
